In Biblical times, eating with someone was the equivalent of calling them an honored guest. It suggested they're a family member and they come under your protection — and they belong. Friend, Hannah and I pray that you invite others to your table for prayer, fellowship and relationship building! Keep inviting Him to the table of your heart as well, and eat the bread of life that will permeate the deepest part of your soul. Take the rich nourishment He gives and share it liberally with others so it can bless them too!
